Call to Order/Moment of Silence

Chairperson Cox called the meeting to order and presided over a moment of silence.

Agenda Review and Approval

Chairperson Cox moved to adopt the agenda as presented. The agenda was approved as presented.

General Public Comment

No public comment.

Approval of Minutes

Chairperson Cox moved to approve the minutes with one correction to add that a motion was made to add revised Policy 3200.6 to be placed on the agenda at the November full Board meeting. Minutes were approved.

Reports

Advanced Academics Update

Public Comment: None

Beth Cross provided an update on the annual report on the 2010-2013 Academically and/or Intellectually Gifted (AIG) plan and the 2013-2016 Academically and/or Intellectually Gifted plan. Ms. Cross also provided an update on the results from the 2012-2013 Advanced Placement exams. The updates each included program strengths, key accomplishments and strategies for the current year.

For the AIG update, Ms. Cross provided an overview on the NC AIG program standards, AIG plan goals for 2013-2016, and the AIG child count for 2009-2013. In addition, Ms. Cross provided program strengths, strategies and opportunities for program improvement.

Next, Ms. Cross provided AP results data for 2009-2013, including data by ethnic groups and results by schools. In addition, information was shared regarding key AP accomplishments, strategies and opportunities for program improvement.

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Board members had a full discussion about this update and the administration will provide responses to the follow-up items as requested.

2013 ACT Summary Results Update

ESL Academic Literacy	ESL teacher works on linguistic needs and academic rigor aimed at exiting advanced ESL students



- Local Options must be present in the school improvement plan.
- Local Options must be approved by DPS Board of Education.



2013-2014 Local Options - Lakeview

Objective	Goal
Attendance	Option 1: The attendance rate was 71% for the 2012-13 academic year and will increase to 75% for the 2013-14 school year.
Student Progress and Proficiency	Option 2: Lakeview will increase overall growth during the school year. Increase students' academic growth rates by 3% performance on SRI and SMI tests at Lakeview School for the 2013-2014 school year.
Parent Involvement	Option 3: The percentage of parents actively involved in the student/school activities transition process for the 2012-13 academic year was 33% and will increase to 35% for the 2013-14 school year.

Delay in EOC and NC Final Exam Grades

- The Department of Public Instruction cannot assign grades to our EOC and NC Final Exams until all schools across North Carolina have completed first semester testing.
- Schools will not receive final exam grades for Biology, Chemistry, Earth Science, Physical Science, Physics, Math I, Math II, Geometry, Algebra II, Advanced Functions & Modeling, Discrete Math, Pre-Calculus, English I, English II, English III, English IV, World History, Civics & Economics, and U.S. History until late January 2014.
