Call to Order/Moment of Silence

Chair Parker moved that the agenda be adopted as presented.

Agenda Review and Approval

The agenda was unanimously approved with a recommended change in the order of the agenda, moving the 21 Credit General Diploma Update to the first item on the agenda and the Truancy Court Update to the second item on the agenda.

Public Comment

There was no public comment.

Approval of Minutes

Chair Parker moved that the minutes be approved as printed; with one question about the status of the follow-up items from the previous committee meeting.

Committee Reports

21 Credit General Diploma Update

Public Comment: None

Jim Key and Pam Taylor provided an update on the 21 Credit General Diploma program and results from 2013. The General Diploma Academic Requirements are prescribed by NCDPI. The 21 Credit General Diploma is an opportunity for students who are off cohort or experiencing extenuating circumstances and may be considering dropping out from high school. Mr. Key

provided examples of extenuating circumstances. A chart outlining a comparison of the DPS Diploma (28 credits) and the 21 Credit General Diploma was also provided, in addition the 21 Credit General Diploma Data by school was also provided.

This report was presented for information only. Board members had a full discussion regarding this update and administration will provide responses to the follow up items as requested, including the question about whether or not DPS could change from a 21 Credit General Diploma to a 24 Credit General Diploma.

Truancy Court Update

Public Comment: None

Theresa McGowan provided an update on Truancy Court in conjunction with members Lisa Gordon-Stella and Grace Marsh, of the Edna B. Spaulding Conflict Resolution Center, who provide oversight to the truancy courts currently in all elementary and secondary schools. Information on the components of truancy court, and information on the number of student served (connected to services and with improved attendance rates) was also provided. Principal LaManda Pryor, W. G. Pearson Elementary School, and Assistant Principal, Calvin Freeman, Neal Middle School provided feedback as well regarding the Truancy Court.

This report was presented for information only. Board members had a full discussion regarding this update and administration will provide responses to the follow up items as requested.

Policy 2210 Tobacco Use - Revised

Public Comment: None

Michelle Smith presented Policy 2210 – Use of Tobacco Products, to review and recommend strengthening the language in the current policy as a result of changes in legislation.

The Board members had a full discussion about this update. The Board voted to place this item on the October Board meeting for Action, second reading.

Summary of Follow Up Items

- 1) Request for disaggregated data by school/race/gender/ECP status for all 21-credit applicants including successful completers. BOE would like administration to explore how the data might also include whether some of the candidates were under consideration for ECP services.
- 2) Administration will research whether a new 24-credit diploma could be established in order for graduates to qualify for admission into the UNC system.
- 3) At a subsequent BOE meeting (School Celebrations), the BOE will thank the volunteer "judges" who served on Truancy Court.
- 4) Is it legal to request teachers to do home visits?
- 5) What is the source of the grant funding for the Duke Partnership Grant?
- 6) Tobacco Use Policy ensure signage at sporting events communicates "Tobacco-Free Products".

There being no further business, Ms. Parker adjourned the meeting.



Performance Composite Gains during the first two years of RttT





Rebound Program – Community Program

- Strengths-focused program for high school on short-term suspension (1-10 days)
- Tutoring and academic support
- Provides assistance with school work and supervision, which reduces the chances for delinquency and juvenile crime during out-of-school time.
- Implements effective interventions that result in positive engagement with school and the community.
